HIGHLIGHTS 2013

THE NMMU Business School's MBA programme now ranks among the top 200 in the world. Of those, NMMU, UCT and Stellenbosch were among only seven executive MBA programmes to receive a four-star rating, the highest possible grade. This rating is according to the Eduniversal 2013-2014 global ranking of Executive MBA degrees, a leading resource used by students around the world to compare top business schools.

Bob Wood, 84, received his PhD in Development Studies, making him NMMU's oldest graduate to date. Dr Wood went to university for the first time at the age of 72 after retiring as an accountant and businessman. For his doctoral studies he examined the relationship between business and apartheid in South Africa particularly the Western Cape, from 1960 to 1990.

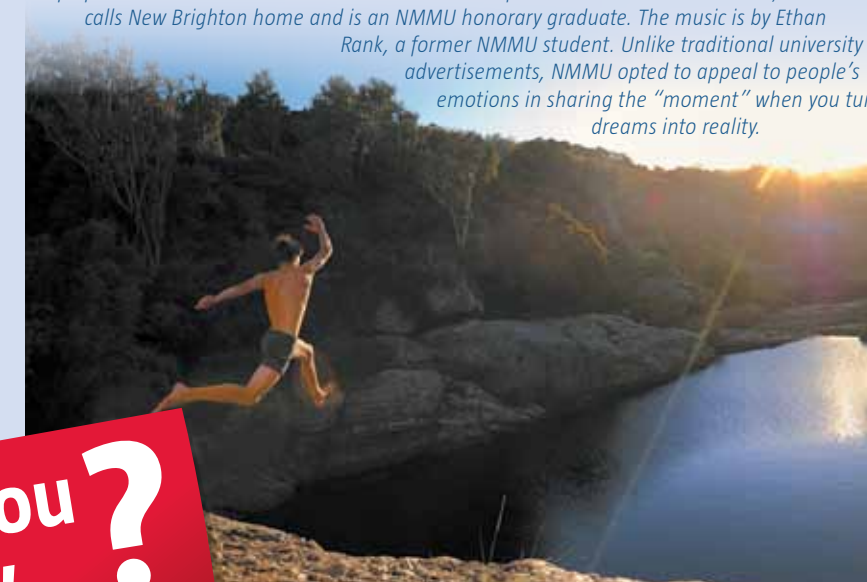
The voices of the NMMU Choir can now be heard all over the world in the soundtrack of an international video game. The choir recorded five soundtracks in the SABC studios, for the video game, Civilisation V. The choir, which turned 20 this year, recently returned from a successful tour in China.

NMMU hosted the annual launch of First Things First, a national campaign for HIV testing and counselling within higher education, with Health Minister Dr Aaron Motsoaledi as keynote speaker. The campaign targets 23 institutions of higher education and some 50 Technical and Vocational Education and Training colleges (TVETs). Through its pro-active Campus Health Services division, NMMU was the first university in South Africa to become a distribution site for anti-retrovirals (ARVs).

A FURTHER R235m was invested in building and equipment across NMMU's six campuses in Port Elizabeth and George early this year and last.

- While the bulk of the funding has come from the Department of Higher Education and Training, NMMU also contributed R50m towards the various projects which include:
- The new "green" Business School (R116m) which opened its doors in April.
- Second Avenue Campus Library (R8.8m) upgrade completed in March.
- Summerstrand Student Residence (R117m) on South Campus is home to 312 students.
- Revamping and re-purposing of the old Human Movement Science premises for the Education Faculty (R4m) on South Campus.
- Second Avenue Campus's 200-seater lecture hall (R8.8m) which opened in July 2014.
- Various improvements for disabled students including lifts, ramps and ablution facilities (R8m).

Approval for Medical School

NMMU moved a step closer to having a fully-fledged medical school when its Council agreed to support bold new initiatives by the university to meet an ever-growing national need for qualified healthcare professionals. With the National Health Insurance (NHI) plan imminent, the university is embarking on a "step-ladder" approach towards its long-term goal of establishing a medical school by systematically introducing a number of key qualifications in the field of healthcare. A full meeting of the NMMU Council, chaired by Judge Ronnie Pillay, agreed to plan and "actively support" the establishment of a medical school at NMMU in a bid to meet healthcare skills requirements for the country, and especially the Eastern Cape. It has received vast support among communities for such a medical school. The university has already revamped its Faculty of Health Sciences into four new schools, introduced a new BSc Dietetics degree and a pharmacy assistant's qualification, and is working closely with key stakeholders, including the Ministry of Health, the Health Professions Council of South Africa, the Council for Higher Education, provincial government and Walter Sisulu University, to ensure that an undergraduate degree for medical doctors is in place by 2018.

Africa's maritime university

PLANS are afoot for NMMU to establish a Marine and Maritime Faculty – and ultimately position the university as the maritime university of South Africa and the African continent. Vice-Chancellor Prof Derrick Swartz said the university was ideally situated in Nelson Mandela Bay, with its rich coastline and two major harbours, the Port of Ngqura and Port Elizabeth Harbour. He said Transnet's R2-billion deepening of Port Elizabeth's harbour would see the city becoming a "trans-shipment hub" (where goods or containers are shipped to an intermediate destination, then transported by sea/land to another destination). Ngqura would become the city's commercial port while Port Elizabeth Harbour would increasingly be used for marine tourism. Prof Swartz said he hoped to "position the university to create opportunities to not just take advantage of our maritime space but to grow it into a vibrant economy". "South Africa has 1 200km of coastline, yet we have never developed a maritime consciousness. We are not a maritime nation." Earlier this year, NMMU signed a Memorandum of Co-operation with the World Maritime University in Sweden. The university was also awarded South Africa's first Research Chair in the Law of the Sea and Development in Africa, which will also assist the university in positioning itself as a major contributor with regard to training and research in the maritime field.

We believe the spirit of the university's values and Vision 2020 is already within all of us



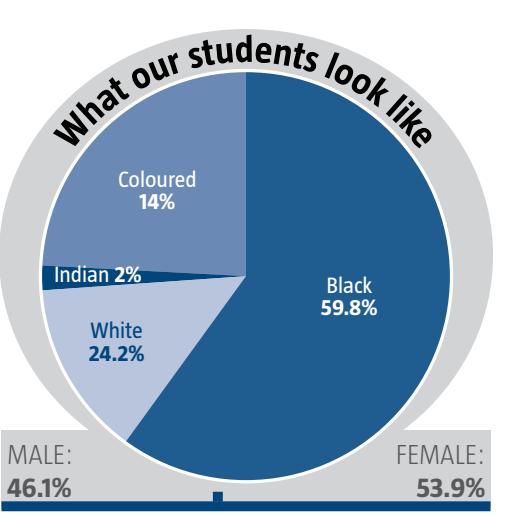
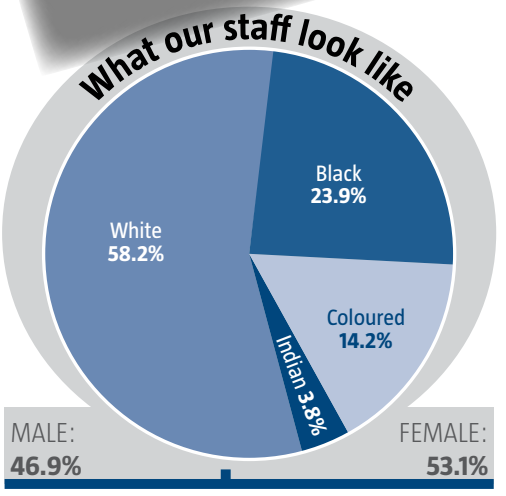

Beyond the Classroom

ANOTHER 217 students have benefitted from NMMU's Beyond the Classroom (BTC) voluntary leadership programme, now into its fifth year.

The programme introduces students to the requirements of leadership in a practical and creative manner, assisting them to develop skills needed for effective, ethical leadership. It also explores and addresses the importance of diversity in daily interactions, encourages teamwork with others from diverse backgrounds, enhances skills in conflict resolution and communication, and encourages intellectual growth over a year-long period.

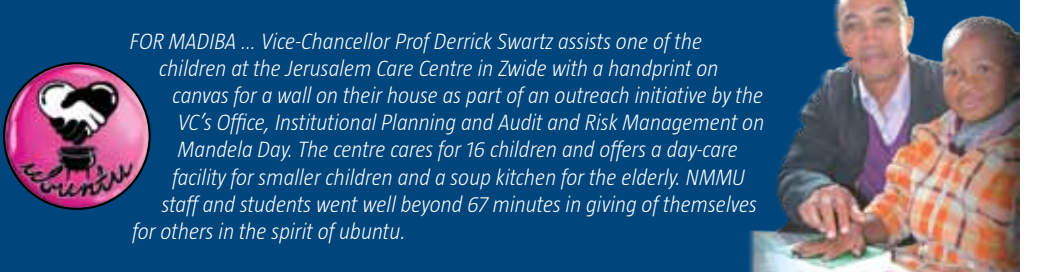
BTC started in 2009 with 29 students. The first programme was so successful that students requested a class be offered at a South Campus residence too. By 2013, classes were offered on North, South, Second and Missionvale campuses and at a residence in Central.

Students are also required to complete 20 hours of community service and this, like every module of the course, ensures that participants are encouraged "to get off your umtarara!"

High-tech healthcare

BLUE tooth scales that instantly transmit data to a PC and stethoscopes, designed to measure heart murmurs in children that connect to mobile devices are just some of the ways primary health care is going high-tech.

A new initiative she is involved in is called Mobile Community Health Learning Space – mobile and tablet technology is used to provide support to vulnerable women and children in the Northern Areas.

It's called e-health or m-health – short for electronic and mobile health – and School of ICT's Prof Darelle van Greunen who has spent three years driving research in this area, hopes it will improve school and community healthcare throughout South Africa, right up to its most remote corners.

"The technology is cutting-edge, everything is linked to a tablet," said Prof Van Greunen.

The data is filed away in cyber space, effectively creating a health profile for patients, that is nonreliant on old-fashioned clinic cards.

"Working with clinic nurses who go out to the schools, we're busy creating health profiles of children, from Grade 1 to Grade 12.

"These innovations empower community health workers – it takes less time to take measurements and it's more accurate and efficient."

The devices and applications are easy to use, thanks to Prof Van Greunen's vast experience in "human computer interaction" and user experience – making computers and mobile devices more accessible to everyone. She even

Honouring top academics

"My passion is working with others, linking science, policy and management to ensure the conservation and sustainable use of South Africa's estuaries," said Prof Adams.

An equally delighted Mr Ismail said he was thrilled to be able to "contribute towards developing the human capital of tomorrow's leaders".

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Growing number of NRF researchers

OVER the past three years, NMMU has seen a 25% increase in the number of researchers rated by the National Research Foundation (NRF) – an important benchmark of research excellence in South Africa.

With 73 NRF-rated researchers, the university prides itself on being among the top 10 South African universities in terms of NRF-ratings.

Among these are two A1-rated researchers – the highest accolade for researchers who meet NRF's criteria for being "unequivocally recognised by their peers as leading international scholars in their respective fields for the high quality and impact of their recent research outputs".

They are distinguished professor of botany Richard Cowling and geology professor Prof Maarten de Wit, who occupies NMMU's Chair of Earth Stewardship Science.
